

Thanksgiving is behind us. Christmas and the New Year is just ahead. What have you done in 2022 to contact your members who are not attending meetings? What have you done to encourage non-active members to become actively involved in your Auxiliary? Have you just left them in the dust of 2022?

Retention is NOT the same as Expansion.

Retention is holding on to the members you have, getting these members to come back to meetings and participate in events. Have you looked at your membership rosters which were just sent out with your Travel Cards? Did you note the members with a G, HL or LM status?

- G=Members in Good Standing
- HL= Honorary Life Members who have continuous service to our order for 25 years plus
- L= Life Members Members who have continuous service to our order for 50 years plus

Do you know how many of your members are CHARTER MEMBERS? Charter Members are your members who helped START your Auxiliary. Are they attending meetings or just events? You need to draw from all your members as they pay dues and encourage them to step up to be officers. You need to water your Garden to make it GROW.

Remember: RETENTION is NOT *getting* new members – It is *keeping* your current membership. It is keeping all members engaged and involved in activities to assist your Auxiliary to Grow and Prosper.

- ✓ Travel cards were mailed to all Financial Secretaries in November including the invoice. Please be sure the 2023 cards are distributed to all dues paying members. Travel cards are to be signed by the Auxiliary President, Auxiliary Financial Secretary, and the member.
- ✓ Supreme Per Capita invoices will soon be mailed to all Financial Secretaries and are to be paid by March 31, 2023. The total sum due is based on the number of members an auxiliary has listed on the Supreme website. It is very important to keep membership lists updated. Check to be sure member status and current address are correct.
- ✓ Invoices from Supreme do not require a vote by the membership for payment. They should be paid immediately to avoid late fees.
- ✓ Be sure IRS filing of 990-N forms are current. For all auxiliaries with their year ending on December 31<sup>st</sup>, the e-postcard is for be filed after January 2023.
- ✓ Be sure your Auxiliary is up to date on financial audits. An audit should be called for in January once December bank statements are available. The Immediate Past President serves as Chair of the Committee. Audits are to be done twice a year and a full reporting is to be submitted to the membership at the Auxiliary business meeting following the audit.
- ✓ A-100 forms are to be completely filled out and appropriately signed for by each new member. Be sure the writing is legible. They are to be mailed to the Supreme Secretary with the \$5.00 fee per new member within 10 days of the Initiation Ceremony. Be timely to avoid late charges. Remember, the signed Code of Conduct page is not to be sent to the Supreme Office. By checking the box and signing the A-100, the member attests to reading and accepting the terms of the Code. The signed page is to be maintained by the Auxiliary.
- ✓ Meeting minutes are the official record of the organization. Minutes are to be approved by the membership at the next meeting and minutes are to be retained indefinitely.
- ✓ The Administration Manual is your go-to-resource for information. Check to be sure your Manual is up to date. The Manual is available for sale at shop.columbiettes.com.

The complete Manual with black binder and pages is \$40 each, the black binder only is \$10 each and pages only is \$30 per packet.

## The Legend of the Poinsettia

A legend is told of Pepita, a poor Mexican girl who had no gift to present the Christ Child at Christmas Eve Mass. As Pepita walked slowly to the chapel with her cousin Pedro, her heart was filled with sadness rather than joy. Pedro said consolingly, "I am sure, Pepita, that even the most humble gift, if given in love, will be acceptable in His eyes".

Not knowing what else to do, Pepita knelt by the roadside and gathered a handful of common weeds, fashioning them into a small bouquet. Looking at the scraggly bunch of weeds, she felt more saddened and embarrassed than ever by the humbleness of her offering. She fought back a tear as she entered the small village chapel.

As she approached the altar, she remembered Pedro's kind words: "....even the most humble gift, if given in love, will be acceptable in His eyes." She felt her spirit lift as she knelt to lay the bouquet at the foot of the nativity scene. Suddenly, the bouquet of weeds burst into blooms of brilliant red and all who saw them were certain that they had witnessed a Christmas miracle right before their eyes. From that day on, the bright red flowers were known as the Flores de Noche Buena, or Flowers of the Holy Night, for they bloomed each year during the Christmas season and thus, the Legend of the Poinsettia was born.

## The History of the Poinsettia

The plant we know today as the *poinsettia* has a long and interesting history. Native to Central America, the plant flourished in an area of Southern Mexico known as Taxco del Alarcon. The Aztecs used the plant for decorative purposes; but, also put the plant to practical use. They extracted a purplish dye for use in textiles and cosmetics from the plant's bracts and the milky white sap, today called latex, was made into a preparation to treat fevers.

The poinsettia may have remained a regional plant had it not been for the efforts of Joel Roberts Poinsett. Poinsett was appointed as the first United States Ambassador to Mexico (1825-1829) by President Madison. Poinsett had attended medical school, but his real love was the scientific field of botany. Poinsett maintained his own hothouses on his Greenville, South Carolina, plantations, and. while visiting the Taxco area in 1828, he became enchanted by the brilliant red blooms he saw there. He immediately sent some of the plants back to South Carolina, where he began propagating the plants and sending them to friends and botanical gardens.

Among the recipients of Poinsett's work was John Bartram of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, who in turn gave the plant over to another friend, Robert Buist, a nurseryman. Mr. Buist is thought to be the first person to sell the plant under its botanical name, Euphorbia Pulcherrima. It is thought to have become known by its more popular name of *poinsettia* around 1836, the origin of the name recognizing the man who first brought the plant to the United States. Congress honored Joel Poinsett by declaring Dec. 12 as National Poinsettia Day which commemorates the date of his death in 1851. The day was meant to honor Poinsett and encourage people to enjoy the beauty of the popular holiday plant. (Joel Roberts Poinsett also founded the Smithsonian Institute.)

## LET'S LEARN

## Díd you know . . .

A **motion** is a proposal made by a member which describes an action or decision for the organization to approve and implement. A member raises her hand to be recognized by the presiding officer, is recognized, stands, states her name, and addresses the officer: "I move we show our gratitude to our Parish Altar Servers for their service by giving each a \$5 gift card."

A motion must be **seconded** (meaning supported) to move forward for consideration, vote, and implementation. *Another member is recognized, stands, states her name, and addresses the officer. She may simply state: "I second the motion" or repeat the motion.* If no member makes a second, the motion failed to move forward or "died on the floor".

After the second is made, the presiding officer repeats the motion in its entirety and asks for **discussion**. All members are permitted to offer their opinions or ask questions. Each wishing to speak should be given a time limit of two minutes should the matter become a lively debate. It is the presiding officer's duty to keep the discussion orderly and allow all to speak.

If no one stands to speak or after all members wishing to speak have spoken, the presiding officer asks for a **vote** on the motion. The method of voting is to be decided by the presiding officer. It may be a voice vote (YES, NO, or ABSTAIN). It may be a show of hands. It may be by secret ballot. (A voter may abstain from voting for a reason such as she does not think she knows enough about the issue at hand to make an informed decision, she believes voting on a particular issue represents a conflict of interest for her, or she is withholding her vote in protest.)

After all votes are cast and counted, the presiding officer announces the motion passed or failed. She **raps** the **gavel** once signifying the action taken.

Please note: Per the Columbiette meeting agenda, please note the following:

Reading of the Minutes: After the Secretary presents the minutes from the previous meeting, the President asks if there are any needed changes. She then announces, "The minutes are approved as read" or "The minutes are a approved as corrected". A motion, a second, and a call to vote are necessary ONLY if the minutes were corrected.

**Reading of the Bills**: The Secretary reads the bills received advising payable to and reason. The President asks for **a motion**, **second**, **and a vote** to pay the bills.

**Treasurer's Report:** When the Treasurer's finishes her report, the Presiding Officer says, "The Treasurer's report will be filed for audit." **No vote is necessary**.

Monies owed to the State Council or Supreme Council should be automatically paid and do not need the approval/vote from the membership.

Other motions may or may not arise during the business meeting.

Only one motion can be discussed at a time.

During the discussion, the motion may be amended or altered before voting on it. "I wish to amend the motion and move to increase the gift cards to \$10.00 each." The amended motion must be seconded and a vote taken.

There may be instances when members want more information before making a decision. In this case, the motion is to be tabled and sent to a committee who will gather the information and report back to the membership.





total of six new sister Columbiettes.





Each year, young ladies who are graduating high school seniors submit essays explaining what being Catholic means to them, while eighth graders pick one community service project completed for their Confirmation preparation, and describe how and why it was meaningful for them. Collectively, their personal views of Catholicism are an insightful and refreshing catechism at a time when the Church is struggling to attract young adult parishioners and spark the interest of its youth.

In addition to the scholarship program, spring, fall, and Christmas flower sales, a diaper drive for young mothers, U.S. flag sales, our War Dog support program, and fundraising for Joining in Sibling Unity (JISU), a program that brings siblings separated by the foster care system together, Kim spearheaded a new event that took place on October 23rd. We hosted a Ladies Victorian Tea Party, whose goal was so much more than a caffeinated Sunday afternoon filled with cucumber sandwiches and period costumes. It was an effort to bring together not just women from our own parish, but women from the entire Hopewell Valley community, to foster new relationships in the Christian spirit. A nominal fee was charged to cover our expenses, which allowed us to break even financially. Given the rave reviews we received, and the fact that our start-up expenses for big-ticket items such as several sets of china and table linens have been covered, we have decided to make this an annual fundraising event that will support, among other endeavors, our scholarship program. Kim saw more than a need for another fundraiser. She saw an avenue through which our organization could increase our presence in the community by the simple act of socializing over a cup of tea.

As Columbiettes, we strive to promote the spiritual, social, and charitable welfare of our members, and to safeguard the religious, civil, and economic rights of all Catholics. In Hopewell, we are proud to recognize that sometimes, on a smaller scale, we may begin to achieve our lofty goals one cup at time. Merry Christmas and may God bless the Columbiettes.




